MAIN FEATURES OF THE MULTI BIRD NEST BOX



Most bird nest boxes are only suitable for two or three types of birds.

The Multi Bird Nest Box from **the Nestbox Company** is specially designed to allow you to change the aperture to attract many different birds in **YOUR GARDEN** from one year to the next without having to change the whole box!

The Nestbox Company's Multi Bird Nest Box comes with three easily interchangeable front panels with different apertures and can also be left open-fronted to attract even more different species of birds.

Birds that you can attract to the **Multi Bird Nest Box** include:-

Panel 1 ~ 25mm ~ Blue Tit, Marsh Tit, Tree Creeper.

Panel 2 ~ 28mm ~ Great Tit, Tree Sparrow, Crested Tit.

Panel 3 ~ 32mm ~ Nuthatch, Pied Flycatcher.

Open Fronted ~ Robin, Spotted Flycatcher, Wren, Song Thrush, Blackbird.

SITING & MANAGEMENT OF THE NEST BOX

Contrary to popular belief, there is no "best" time to put up bird nest boxes.

Birds will quickly become familiar with boxes erected during the latter part of the year and may well use them for winter roosts especially if they contain a little hay or wood shavings. Boxes erected by February stand the best chance of being used that season, but it is not unusual for tits to take over boxes in April if there is a shortage of natural sites.

The important thing is to site the box correctly in a position where the birds will be safe from potential predators.

SITING

Nest boxes can be fixed to walls, fences, trees or buildings. If the site is exposed it is advisable to position them so that the opening is not exposed to the sun or the wettest weather, and when fixing, try to position them at an angle so that rain is directed away from the entrance hole.

Choose a spot between 10ft and 15ft above ground level where there is easy flight access to the opening, and above all make sure that they cannot be reached by any marauding cats.

If you can site them near your boundary you may attract birds from some distance away.

MANAGEMENT

It is advisable to clean out boxes in October/November. Any fleas or other parasites that have built up should be killed off with boiling water and any unhatched eggs should be removed.

Once the box is clean and dry, add a little hay or wood shavings to encourage the birds to use it for a winter roost & reserve it for the next breeding season.

During the breeding season it is very tempting to open the box to see what is happening, but this should only be done with great caution as your presence may well cause the birds to desert the nest.

If you do wish to look, first tap lightly on the side of the box to allow the birds to leave the nest without being startled, but never open a box when it contains any young or the parents may well desert with disastrous results.

It is far better to watch the activities from a reasonable distance and to enjoy the pleasure of a successful brood brought off the nest.
